

Film Review: Hot Fuzz

Hardcore copper Nicolas Angel (Simon Pegg) fights crime in London, and does a better job than any other policeman, eh, officer (he is not just a

good officer, he is politically correct too). Still his superiors think it's better to send him to work in a small village, with the lowest crime rate in the country: he made them look bad, and we can't have that now can we? To make things even worse for Angel, his girlfriend tells him they definitely won't get back together, as he is married to his job (and his Japanese Peace Lily)...

Juxtaposing the big city and the tiny village provides perfect opportunity for presenting clichés, and especially village life is commented on. The batty old neighbour waving a gun around as soon as a stranger comes near, the close-knit social life, and the keeping up of appearances: they all seem to be mirror-images of the kind of Santa-turned-bad-and-stabbed-a-cop stories representing London life.

Although Sandford seems a peaceful village, its shady side comes out soon enough: there is an extremely high accident rate, which needs looking in to. Or so Angel thinks. The Sandford police think that he has simply become paranoid by his "London time." Angel and his new partner Danny Butterman (yes, he's fat), played by Nick Frost, start investigating all the same. Butterman is an oafish sort of guy, in perfect contrast with the civilised Angel (the

type excellent with fire-arms but against their use). However, the course of events brings them together. Butterman helps Angel to relax, and to enjoy drama and "hot fuzz," while Angel helps Butterman off his lazy bottom to become a real police officer.

This film will remind you of Stepford Wives, Scream and famous action films, but most of all it is packed with British humour: it is slapstick, but in a British way. The very best characteristic of this film is that is has its moments of insight, as you get glimpses of the round side of the flat characters, but then it immediately returns to its over the top style. This way it holds your attention, but it doesn't keep you from laughing your head off at the final attack by the runaway swan... By Merel Mookhoek
